

## TURNER - HISTORY

### NEW:

From an obituary I have learned that the grandfather of George Turner [1835-1906] was an officer in the English Army. Unfortunately the obit did not mention the grandfather's name. This grandfather would be the father of our first known Turner, Joseph, who married Emily Knox. The time that this grandfather might have been in the army may be at the time of Joseph's birth, c.1797, and Joseph was said to have been born in Nottingham. Whether that is the town or the county is not known. Assuming this is all true then the grandfather may have been in a regiment that was based in that region.

### England

*The Turner name follows the occupational naming form for surnames. Thus, one who turns; such as a lathe or a mill stone. On the shield of the above arms you can see 4 mill stones.*

*From census records of Michigan, USA I found that our first known Turner, Joseph Turner, was from Nottingham and that he was born c. 1797. At this point I do not have enough information to know which of the several Joseph Turners born in Nottingham, between 1796 & 1798, is ours. Newspaper articles, biographies and census say that Emily (Emiline) Knox, who married Joseph Turner, was born Dec, 1816 at Dudley, Worcester, England. Her father was Tobias Knox and the mother may have been Elizabeth. No record for the parishes of and around Dudley have revealed any information for this family. Using the 'soundex' there are many variations of this name, Knox, such as Nock, Nockes, etc. None of these 'like' names have provided any solid information for the Knox family.*

*My second problem with the original Turner's is that, by affidavit, I found that Joseph Turner and Emily Knox were married 15 Mar, 1834. Where, is the question?*

## United States

*By an account given by their first born, George Turner [b.1835], his parents '..met in New York state and came to Michigan in the early 30s'. There was a Tobias Knox in Utica, NYS in 1832; his occupation was a 'fancy letterer'. I found that he had a couple of daughters but none named Emily. In 1832, Utica was overtaken with the plague and many of the inhabitants scattered. From a city directory of Cleveland for 1837 I found a Tobias Knox living in that city and also a Mrs. E. Turner at the same address. In 1850 and 1860 I found Tobias Knox living in Canton, Ohio. From all this, and not proving that this Tobias is our Emily's father, it tells me that Joseph and Emily may have married in New York state, Ohio or Michigan. A remote possibility is Indiana.*

*My first recorded finding of Joseph and Emily is in 1835, Michigan Territory, USA. Two years prior to statehood. They apparently settled at Clinton in Lenawee county and operated a grist-mill. In 1837 Joseph and Emily were occupying and running a gristmill on the north branch of River Rouge at Dearbornville, Wayne county. 1846-47 they operated a dry goods store at the west half of Lot 28, Section 9 on Madison Avenue. in Detroitland (Detroit). In June of 1848 Joseph bought a store and grist mill at Stoney Creek, Oakland County, Michigan. On 21 Nov, 1848 Joseph died leaving his wife, Emily Knox, with 6 children and one child unborn.*

*Their children were: George, Charles, Edwin, William, Emily, Albert and Joseph.*

*George became a surveyor and achieved the rank of Captain in the Civil War (War of the Rebellion). He remained in Michigan.*

*Charles was involved with the lumber business and lived and worked at Saginaw, Michigan.*

*Edwin moved to Chicago.*

*William moved to South Bend, Indiana*

*Emily remained in Michigan and may have died at childbirth*

*Albert entered the Civil War and died at Farmington, Miss.*

*Joseph was involved with the lumber business in Bay City, Mich. and had mills in Ontario, Canada.*

### 11 **Joseph TURNER Sr. [c.1797-1848] & Emiline (Emily) KNOX [1816-1911]**

*Joseph Turner*, possibly the son of an English Army officer; was born c.1797 in Nottinghamshire, England and immigrated to the United States about 1825; it was reported that he was in New York State when he met Emily KNOX; married Emily on 15 Mar., 1834 and arrived in Michigan Territory ( 2 years prior to statehood) in 1835 and prior to their first born, George; settled at Clinton in Lenawee County; involved with mercantile and grist mill; operated a gristmill on the Rouge River, Wayne County in 1837; moved to Detroit in 1846 or 1847 and operated a dry goods and grocery store; June of 1848 bought a grist mill and store at Stoney Creek, , Avon Twmsp. , Oakland Co., Michigan; on 21 Nov., 1848 Joseph died leaving his wife, 6 children and one child unborn.

\* may have operated the grist mill on the river Raisin

\* the Rouge River location was .....on the North Branch of The Rouge River between the grist mill known as Rufus Wells and the grist mill occupied by said Turner to a post on land between Wells and Dumois...thence to the bank of the river;

\* the Detroit store location was at ...the west half of Lot 28, Section 9 on Madison Avenue. in Detroitland (Detroit);

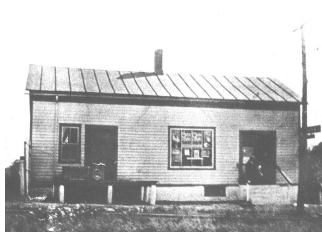
\* the Stoney Creek locations were Lots 12, 13 & 35 of Stoney Creek (sometimes spelt Stony Creek); a member and Treasurer (1847-1848) of the Detroit Masonic Lodge; probable burial place is at the Stoney Creek Cemetery, Avon Twmsp. , Saginaw Co., Michigan. (grave not found)

*Emily Knox* was born 14 Dec., 1816 at Dudley, Worcester, England and emigrated from England to New York State c. 1830; father - Tobias KNOX; married Joseph TURNER in 1834; moved with Joseph to Michigan 2 years prior to Michigan becoming a state; Joseph died in 1848 at Stoney Creek; much of Emily is known from the various affidavits that she made and of those that were made on her behalf and other information was provided by County Records; November 1848, Joseph died and left her with 6 young children and one child yet to be born; George her first child was 15 years old; creditors of the store goods filed claims against the goods and Emily fought them off for two years; the creditors, I assume, could not believe that Emily was capable of running the store; Emily was left with a debt of \$4,000.00; within the next two years, 1848-1850 Emily disposed of the Detroit property and remained at Stoney Creek fending off the creditors; c. 1852 moved to Pontiac; the creditors received 10 cents on the dollar; Emily was left poor and relied on her children to support her; 1862 moved to Saginaw and lived with her son, Charles; affidavits and applications for Pension regarding her son, Albert who died in 1862, in the War of the Rebellion, state that she was married 15 Mar., 1834; these forms gave no witnesses nor the location of that marriage; longest known friend, from these papers, was Andrew W. Freeto who had known her since 1834; on one of her affidavits when was asked to supply disinterested individuals who knew of her personal affairs, Emily stated that "....she was not in the habit of disclosing personal information to disinterested persons."

Emily remained with her son, Charles at 1702 Court St., Saginaw until her death on 30 May, 1911 at the age of 94; outlived all her children except Charles who died 2 years later; buried 1 Jun, 1911 in Oakwood Cemetery, Saginaw, Mich.

*George, son of Joseph Turner & Emily Knox; born Michigan, 1835; attended school at Detroit; became cadet in the Surveyor-Generals Department, United States Survey; continued in this department after school; became County Surveyor of Midland County and Michigan Register of Deeds; married Julia Ann Smith, of Midland, 22Mar. 1857; on the outbreak of the Civil War (War of the Rebellion) entered service in Company "B" Tenth Infantry, Michigan Volunteers as a 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant on 6 May., 1861 at Saginaw; made 1st Lieutenant, 23 Jun, 1862; promoted to Captain 16 Nov, 1863 (Co. 'A'); and in 1864 was transferred to the 1st Engineers Veteran Volunteers; affidavits tell us that he was wounded by a Russian Officer; in 1865 was discharged from service and became engaged in contracting in Tennessee, George, Alabama and Arkansas; in 1881 returned to Michigan and in 1882 became Town Engineer in Bay City, Michigan where he was responsible for the construction of many historical public buildings in Bay City including the City Hall and Belinda Street & 23rd Street Bridges; resided on the corner of Sixth and Sheridan Sts. (poss: 1209 Sixth St.); first married Julia Smith of Midland, Michigan and they had one girl, Edith; In 1865 he was divorced from Julia and, while at Chattanooga, married second wife Sophia P. Thompson who was from Georgia; they had one son, George Edwin who married Kathleen Atkinson; died 30 Aug., 1906, . 70,8,4; buried 2 Sep, 1906, Elm Lawn Cemetery, Bay City, Mich.*

*Edith, daughter of George Turner & Julia Smith; born, 3 May, 1860, in Michigan; married 29 Aug, 1877 (one record show 25th) Isrl H. Richardson; died Midland, Midland County, Michigan on Jan, 3, 1931 (Obit. date: 8 Jan, 1931, P.2); interred in Richardson Plot, Sec. E, Midland Cemetery, Midland, Michigan*

*Isrl, born at Port Dover, Ontario, Canada on 23 Apr, 1846; his father died when Isrl was 6yrs; mother, Estes Richardson (1870 Midland Census shows her age at 50yrs (bc. 1820) and is keeping House, born Canada West (Ontario)), and remaining family move to Genesee County, Michigan, c.1852; he moves to Midland in 1863 and was known as 'Dick'; a carpenter and builder; joined, at age 17, the 29th Michigan Infantry, Company 'H' in 1864; 1870 census shows him as a carpenter and born Canada West (Ontario); 1880 census shows him with Edith, Julia E. and Reid; member of Unitarian Church; 1894 Michigan Veteran Index shows him in the 3rd Ward of Saginaw City; died 24 Jun, 1920 and was living at the home on Jerome Street, Midland, Michigan; interred in Richardson Plot, Sec. E, Midland Cemetery, Midland, Michigan (Richardson Plot has (assumed) a brother of Isrl, C.A. Richardson and some of his family)*









"**MIDLANDER GIVES LIFE IN BELGIUM** - Death of Pfc. Fred Richardson of Midland in action with Lieut. Gen. George S. Patton's Third U. S. Army in Belgium, Jan. 14 was reported Thursday evening by the War Department. Message was received here by his parents M. and Mrs. I. H. Richardson of 409 West Indian street. He is survived by his parents and his wife, the former Margaret Burr of Concord, Cal., to whom he was married March 6, 1944, and who is now resident in San Francisco. Pfc. Richardson was born in Midland May 20, 1917, was graduated by Michigan State College in June of 1941 and the following August entered the Army. He trained first with a Chemical Warfare battalion at Camp Grant, Ill., for a brief period before he was sent to Schofield Barracks, Hawaii, where he was stationed at the time of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. The Midlander was spending the week-end of Dec. 7, 1941, in Honolulu with Richard Haney of this city when the attack occurred. The following June he was returned to California, where he trained as an Air Corps Cadet for 13 months in three camps, Santa Ana, Santa Maria, and Sacramento. Another brief period was spent with a Chemical Warfare unit at Fort Riley, Kan., after which he was transferred to Washington State College at Pullman under an Army Specialized Training program. He was married while at Pullman, but when the training program was abandoned



by the Army in March of 1944, he was sent to Camp Cooke, Cal., where he was placed with a tank battalion. It was with this unit that he went overseas in early October, 1944. He was in England until December, and on Jan. 1 of this year entered actual combat in Belgium. Last letter received from him here was written Jan. 11."

Richardson Died Very Suddenly Thursday Night, June 24 Late Thursday night many Midland homes were shocked and grieved by the news of the death of a long time resident and veteran of the war for the preservation of the Union. I. H. Richardson having passed away a little after seven o'clock almost without previous illness, he having retired but a short time before, complaining of some pain. The doctors called the trouble acute indigestion. Israel H. Richardson was born in Port Dover, Canada, April 23, 1846. His father died when Israel was but six years old and his mother and family came to Genesee County, Michigan about the same time. In 1863 Israel came to Midland where he became generally known as "Dick" He became a carpenter and builder. August 29, 1877 he was married to Edith Turner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Turner. Mr. Turner built the little house on Main street that stands next to the Fire House and Edith was born there. At first Mrs. Turner could not see the street from the house because of the underbrush. Mr. Turner was the first Register of Deeds of the county. Mr. Richardson was a member of the Unitarian Church and was treasurer of the Midland organization. He was a Macabee and a Grand Army man, he having been in the Civil War service in the 29th Michigan Infantry, serving in Georgia under Capt. E. P. Allen. He enlisted in 1864. The funeral took place at the home on Jerome Street, Sunday 2:30 p.m. attended by Grand Army men and members of the American legion and many friends. Rev. T. E. Hoakley conducted the brief services there and was Chaplain at the Midland cemetery, where the Grand Army ritual was read. John Rice, bugler, sounded the final taps. The pallbearers were Rollin Closs, P. T. Rich, Oscar Odell, Tom Davis, Leo Nehil, Lawrence Inman. Honorary pallbearers: Benjamin F.

Bradley, Walter J. Finney, William O'Brien, Ira Fales, Edgar J. Lee, S. C. Stokes. Surviving sons are Reid of North Tonawanda, N. Y., I. Harold of Midland, Eric of Detroit; Daughters: Lulu (Mrs. William Reardon), California; Jessie (Mrs. George Burd), Milwaukee; Irene (Mrs. Glen Skeleton), St. Charles; and Miss Geraldine, New York City, a professional nurse. All were present at the funeral. Mrs. Eliza Turner, 1514 Center Avenue, widow of the late Joseph Turner, wealthy lumberman, died suddenly shortly after 6 o'clock last night in J.F. Martin's drug store, Washington and Columbus Avenues, from heart disease. Mrs. Turner was on her way home from an auto trip to Saginaw in company with D.F. Johnson, a demonstrator for the Olds Motor Works, who was doing special work for the Mohr Bros. Garage, the local Olds agency. Mrs. Turner was in her usual health and during the afternoon there was no hint of any affliction. She had been considering an auto purchase and the run to Saginaw was for the purpose of demonstrating the car. She had recently become quite enthusiastic over motoring.

The auto had reached Garfield and Columbus Avenues when Mrs. Turner was first attacked. Mr. Johnston thought that dust had caused a coughing fit, as Mrs. Turner seemed to be choking. She recovered somewhat but as she seemed to be in distress, Johnson swung the auto over to Martin's drug store and assisted Mrs. Turner into the store. The proprietor, seeing that Mrs. Turner was ill immediately gave such relief as was possible, and Dr. Ambrose who was just passing by, was called in. Mrs. Turner lost consciousness rapidly and heroic measures were hurriedly resorted to without avail.

Mrs. Turner was 54 years old and had been a resident of Bay City 33 years, coming here with her husband from Saginaw 33 years ago, almost immediately after their wedding in that city. Four sons survive. They are Arthur B. of New York City; Dwight J. and Clarence of Toronto, Canada; and Stanley Turner of Midland, Ontario. Joseph Turner, the husband and father died almost three years ago under much similar conditions in the lobby of a hotel in Toronto, heart disease also being the cause of his death. In her death Mrs. Turner had the fulfillment of a wish expressed to several of her friends that when the inevitable came, she hoped it would come as it had with her husband, quickly and painlessly.

Besides the sons there survive also two brothers and two sisters -- John McFarlin of Turner, Mich, Robert McFarlin of this city, Mrs. M. J. Blackmar of Saginaw and Mrs. Herbert Bowdin of Owosso.

Arrangements for the funeral services are held in abeyance pending advices from the sons, who have been notified of the death.

"SUDDEN DEATH OF GEORGE TURNER City Engineer of Bay City - Former Prominent Citizen of Midland and County Official. Father of Mrs. I. H. Richardson. FOUND DEAD IN HIS BED Captain George Turner, City Engineer of Bay City, was found dead in his bed the morning of August 30, the cause of death being heart disease. He had evidently been dead several hours. There was no indication of any struggle, but rather the appearance of having passed away in a quiet sleep. Mr. Turner had suffered with rheumatism for more than a year, but had continued his official duties, and had retired the night before his death at about nine o'clock in good spirits. Capt. George Turner, one of the oldest civil engineers in the state of Michigan, was born in Clinton, Branch County, January 29, 1835 and was reared in Detroit. His father was James<sup>1</sup> Turner, a native of Nottinghamshire, Eng. and a miller and baker by trade. The grandfather was an officer in the English army. In 1856 Mr. Turner became deputy United States surveyor. In 1858 he came to Midland. He was elected surveyor and register of deeds, held the office for two years and was reelected. In July 1861 he raised part of a company for the Tenth Michigan Infantry and enlisted as a private<sup>2</sup>. In October he was made second lieutenant. In 1862 first lieutenant and in 1863 he was commissioned captain of the First U. S. Veteran Engineers. When mustered out in 1865 he had been in the service more than four and a half years. He remained in the south for some time after the war. In 1881 he came to Bay City, was city engineer 1882 to 1891 and from 1891 to the time of his death. He was a man of unswerving integrity and no grafter could make a deal with him. The deceased was the father of Mrs. I. H. Richardson<sup>3</sup> of Midland. Mr. and Mrs. Richardson, Reid<sup>4</sup>, Dwight<sup>5</sup> and Irene<sup>6</sup>, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Burd<sup>7</sup> and J. W. Snell attended the funeral held at Bay City Sunday at Trinity church the largest funeral ever held in that city. Capt. Turner was a Grand Army comrade, also one of the Loyal Legion and an Elk. Wm. Patterson of Midland was in his company in the war. His mother<sup>8</sup> is 91 years of age and lives in Saginaw with her only living son, Charles Turner. Joseph Turner, for 25 years one of the most prominent lumbermen of the Saginaw valley died suddenly about 10:30 last night at the King Edward hotel, Toronto, where he was staying while on a business trip. Information of his death was received here late last night, but the cause of his sudden demise was not given. The news came as a great shock to the relatives here as it was not known that Mr. Turner was ill. Mrs. Turner was completely prostrated.

The deceased had recently arrived in the city, accompanied by members of his family, from Midland, Ont., where he was engaged in lumbering to spend the winter. Only a few days ago he left for the trip which has been cut short by his death. He was 56 years old and was survived by a widow and four sons, Dwight, Stanley, Arthur and Clarence Turner and also a brother George Turner, city engineer of Bay City. Dwight Turner is present in Midland, where his father operated, cutting from 30,000,000 to 40,000,000 feet of lumber annually. Mr. Turner has been engaged in lumbering in Ontario for the past seven years.

Joseph Turner first entered the lumber business in the employ of the late S. H. Webster. Subsequently he engaged in lumbering for Millar & Lewis and then entered into partnership with the late W. Filson H. Toosey. After the fire of 1892 which ??? Miller mill out of existence, Mr. Turner entered into partnership with Albert Miller, purchased the old ??lodgett mill in Muskegon and brought it to this city, erecting it on the site of the burned structure, where it was operated for several years after this Mr. Turner and ? O. Fisher engaged in the lumber business, the firm name being Fisher & Turner. When this partnership was dissolved Mr. Turner engaged lumbering in Canada.

### WITHOUTUTTERINGWORD

Joseph Turner Died in Arms of Clerk  
at Hotel King Edward - Death  
Apparently Painless

Cause Was Evidently Heart Disease

A dispatch from Dwight J. Turner at Toronto to the Tribune yesterday contained the first details of the death of his father, Joseph Turner, at the King Edward hotel, in that city Mr. Turner had gone to his room to retire for the night, a clerk accompanying him. Death came instantly without warning of any kind and Mr. Turner collapsed in the arms of the clerk.

Apparently the end was painless. No exclamations or final words to indicate either pain or consciousness were uttered by the stricken man.

Dwight J. Turner, a son, who was at Midland, Ont.. arrived at Toronto yesterday afternoon and with Clarence Turner, who is also there, took charge of the remains. They left Toronto at midnight and will arrive here at 12:40 this afternoon via the Michigan Central. The funeral party will be met by an escort from Bay City Commandery No 26, Knights Templar, of which the deceased was a member and the remains will be taken direct to the home on Center Avenue and McClellan street.

The cause of death was a apparently an affliction of the heart, although Mr. Turner was not known to be suffering from the disease and never had any attacks indicating that the organ was affected in any way. He had been suffering, however, for some time from stomach trouble, which at times was severe. Arrangements for the funeral will not be perfected until the arrival here of Mrs. Turner's sons.

Joseph Turner was the head of the Turner Lumber Co., operating extensively in Georgian bay district, the firm being composed entirely of members of Mr. Turner's family. The company cut logs and had them sawed by the thousand, operating no mill of its own. This year the company manufactured about 35,000,000 feet of lumber, its logs being sawed in mills at Cutler, south River and Midland. Mr. Turner has been very prosperous the last few years owing to the activity in Canadian lumber and there is assurances that he will leave his family well provided for.

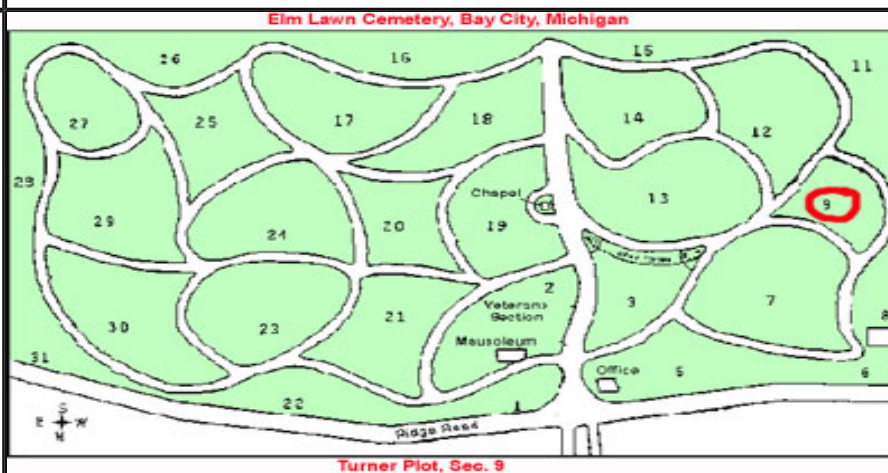
